Our aim in our work is to provide a consistent service to all users, whether these are members of the public wishing to volunteer or organisations seeking volunteers. I would like to thank the staff of GVC and the volunteers who have assisted us maintain our services in a more difficult funding environment. I would also like to thank both staff and volunteers for their outstanding commitment to their work, which has enabled us to deal with the increasing work that the GVC is involved in. Our hard working volunteers this year were Kay Tighe, Raphael Frendo, Marta Jambrina, Breda Brennan, and Michal Krzywonos.

2010 has seen Galway Volunteer Centre develop a high quality promotional campaign called 'I Do It – Volunteer This Year' that has focussed on the diverse reasons people volunteer but has also emphasised the message that anyone can volunteer.

In October we co-ordinated the National Day of Volunteering in Galway City. 2 projects took place on the day which linked local businesses with community organisations for once-off volunteering activities. We also hosted Galway Bay's Keith Finnegan Show from our Mill Street office.

In just over 4 years of existence, the GVC has become a key part of the community and public infrastructure in Galway City and County and has helped to ensure that it has never been easier to help out in the local community. What Does Galway Volunteer Centre Do?

We provide a very simple but valuable service.

If you would like to volunteer, we provide you with a constantly updated list of volunteer roles that non-profit organisations wish to fill. We can help you to decide which role is most suitable for you and we also provide a regular update on any new volunteer opportunities that organisations send to us. We can also find projects for teams of volunteers to get involved in.


If you need volunteers, we provide access to over 5,000 potential volunteers in Galway City and County. We can also provide you with support on managing your volunteers, through the provision of training but also by providing ongoing support whenever you need it. We now can also provide access to Garda Vetting for volunteers who are working with children on vulnerable adults.


This simple and straightforward service means that we have taken a lot of the tedious work out of finding volunteer work or finding volunteers. Finding volunteer work is now easier than ever before, and we have volunteers with a wide and diverse range of skills who want to help out in the community.


Who Volunteers?

New people register with Galway Volunteer Centre to find volunteer work everyday. When you register, you can meet a staff member who can assist you in finding a suitable volunteer role, and you get a fortnightly update on any new volunteer opportunities we receive.

In 2010, 1572 new people registered to use our service. The following graphs give a breakdown of whose these people are.







What Volunteers Think of Our Service

We follow up with every person who registers with us to find volunteer work to find out whether or not they have been able to start volunteering. We also offer everyone the chance to visit our office and meet with a staff member who can sit with the volunteer and find suitable volunteer opportunities. An immediate commitment is not necessary and people can take the details on opportunities with them and decide to volunteer whenever they choose.

564 meetings held with members of the public in 2010

490 volunteer placements were created in 2010

44306 volunteer hours were created in 2010

I think it's a fantastic service that you are providing to both parties and I commend the centre on the good work so far!! Thanks for helping me help others!


There's very little you could do to improve the service. I used it for the first time last April and I was put in touch straight away with a volunteer driven charity which I am very happy with

I think the service is well organised as it is because the volunteering vacancies are listed under the relevant headings on the website and that is what a volunteer needs to save time


Who Needs Volunteers?

Galway Volunteer Centre works with a diverse range of non-profit organisations who fill out role descriptions for any volunteer opportunities that they have. We carry out follow up work for each opportunity to see if organisations have been successful in finding volunteers and we can provide extra support for organisations such as one-to-one meetings or training in Volunteer Management. GVC also provides access to the Garda Vetting service for non-profit organisations in Galway city and county.

As you can see from the statistics below, our service has been used by over 300 organisations and we have advertised over 1000 volunteer opportunities since 2006.










Growth of Galway Volunteer Centre 2006 - 2010

The use of GVCs services by members of the public and has continued to grow since 2006. The graphs below show how quickly that has happened. We follow up with every volunteer that registers with us to find out if they have started volunteering and if so, how much time they spend volunteering. This enables us to provide an estimate of volunteering hours contributed by volunteers registered with Galway Volunteer Centre. Surveys carried out annually with volunteers and organisations have shown an overwhelming satisfaction with our service, though we are continually trying to improve it for all.







Other Services to Organisations

Volunteer Management Training

GVC staff are trained to deliver a Volunteer Management Programme to organisations that involve volunteers. This programme consists of 4 modules:

- Planning for Volunteer Involvement and Designing Volunteer Roles
- Recruiting, Selecting and Inducting Volunteers
- Supporting and Supervising Volunteers
- Designing a Policy for Volunteer Involvement

This training aims to support organisations to source suitable volunteers for their organisations but also to help them ensure that volunteers enjoy their work and stay with the organisations for as long as possible.

The Volunteer Management Programme was delivered on 2 occasions in 2010, firstly to a group consisting of organisations working with people with a disability and secondly to a more diverse group of organisations.



Garda Vetting

In 2009 Galway Volunteer Centre began providing an administrative service that enables organisations that do not have access to the Garda Vetting Bureau to vet their volunteers. GVC hopes that by providing this service, local non-profit organisations will be supported in working from best practice guidelines in relation to their work with children and vulnerable adults. GVC provides one-to-one training for organisations using the service.

What Organisations Think of Our Services

GVC is a very useful and effective service for both volunteers and organisations wishing to find volunteers. Training provided is a crucial element in the whole volunteer process. Well done for providing an excellent service.
